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## **Instagram block list**

Learn how to quickly block and unblock Instagram users from within the app or website. To block someone on Instagram, go to their profile, tap the three-dot menu icon, click Block, and then confirm by clicking Block again. To unblock a user, access your settings, select Blocked, choose the user, and tap Unblock. Note that you can't unblock yourself from another user's block list. You can view your blocked users on Instagram by going to your profile settings > Privacy > Blocked. Clicking on any blocked account takes you to their profile page, where you can unblock them if needed. The West Fourth Street subway station serves as a major transfer hub for several subway lines. The street is home to the iconic "Cage" basketball and handball courts, a spot where many of New York's top basketball players have been known to congregate. This area has long been at the forefront of the Village's bohemian lifestyle. Historic spots on West 4th Street include The Mad Hatter tea room, which served as an intellectual meeting ground for artists and thinkers, and the infamous Golden Swan bar, where playwright Eugene O'Neill was a frequent patron. Notable residents have included writers Willa Cather and John Reed, who wrote about the Bolshevik Revolution in his work "Ten Days That Shook the World." The street also hosted Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney's Whitney Studio Club, which launched the careers of artists like Edward Hopper. This cultural hub continued with the establishment of Gerde's Folk City, a famous folk club where Bob Dylan and Simon & Garfunkel made their New York debuts.
