Successfully completing The Grand Tour in Nuka-World requires proper preparation and strategic planning. Utilize perks like Ghoulish and Wasteland Whisperer to easily navigate through challenging areas within the DLC. Grab unique weapons like The Problem Solver and bring followers along to tackle tough enemies and quests effectively. The
final DLC to Fallout 4 transports the player into the middle of the desert where a quirky bunch of raiders have set up camp in a rundown amusement park. Nuka-World provides unique gameplay in that regard, not only due to its vibrant and bright environment, but also thanks to the raider storyline. Related While Fallout 4 is the first mainline entry in
the franchise not to feature Centaurs, it was originally meant to have their scariest version yet. One of the first major quests when the Sole Survivor arrives in the park is to liberate the five other areas surrounding Nuka-Town. This quest is called the Grand Tour, and is likely going to take the majority of the player's attention due to how long and
challenging it is. Not to worry, however, since properly preparing for this monumental task helps to complete it with success in no time. Updated on June 15, 2024, by Matthew Weideman: As many players dive back into Fallout 4 after the success of Amazon's Fallout TV show, they'll likely need a hand getting through some of the game's more difficult
quest lines. The Nuka World DLC is a fun but difficult section of the game, and while it's fun to go in blind to explore and discover with fresh eyes, there are some parts of this additional content that players will almost undoubtedly struggle to get through. with each of the three Nuka-World raider gang bosses. When talking to Mason, the leader of the Pack, players should choose only the right-hand dialog option. If they do this and pass the Charisma check with him, Mason will give the Sole Survivor a gun called The Problem Solver. This rifle has the Furious legendary mod, which increases its damage
by 15% for every consecutive hit against a target within the last ten seconds. This gun makes short work of the many Nuka-World enemies that are normally bullet sponges, as each hit deals more and more damage. If players fail the Charisma check with Mason, they can also buy a gun called the Splattercannon, which has this same mod, from the
Nuka-Town Market. This perk requires 9 Charisma The Wasteland Whisperer perk gives players the chance to pacify, and even command (at higher ranks) the mutated creatures found in the game fall under this category, and fighting with them is much
easier than fighting against them. Cave crickets, Deathclaws, Bloodworms, and more can be tamed by players with this perk. Since these enemies are found throughout the desert between the parks (and all over Dry Rock Gulch in the case of the Bloodworms), having this perk is extremely useful anywhere in the Nuka-World DLC area. Each type of
Nuka Cola offers different bonuses In addition to the many collectible items in Fallout 4, players can mix different Nuka-Cola varieties together to create powerful drinks that can save their life later on. Each recipe has a different effect, such as "Nuka-Sunrise", which
regenerates health and Action Points in addition to increasing rad resistance. There are Nuka-Mixer stations in each of the five parks, and players can also build them in their settlements. Saving up each individual type of Nuka-Cola and then mixing them into more powerful sodas is a great way to have extremely powerful aid items on hand when in a
tough situation. There are 5 parks and only 3 raider gangs The whole point of the quest is ultimately to divide the park by raider factions. Each gang is eager and greedy to get their slice of cake, and they'll pester the Sole Survivor about it regularly even as they're still finishing the quest. After each park is freed, the player must raise a flag for one of
the factions. Dividing the park equally isn't possible, but it is possible to make sure two gangs will stay loyal to the player until the end by giving both of them two parks. The last gang will therefore only get one, and will be the one to turn on the player at a later stage. So, make the choice of whom to support early on, and don't divide the parks willy-
nilly. Starting these quests before leaving Nuka-Town saves time Before heading out to explore these parks, spend a bit more time in Nuka-Town to grab a few additional quests. These are collection quests, so it's best to get them now so that the player doesn't have to return to the parks and go through them all at a later stage. Related Fallout 4 puts
a lot of emphasis on rebuilding rather than character interaction. These are some pro-tips to getting more scrap and materials. Make sure to speak with Sierra, who will most likely be somewhere around The Parlor in Nuka-Town, and grab the quest Cappy In A Haystack from her. Also speak to N.I.R.A., the Nuka-Cola shaped Protectron patrolling the
outside of the marketplace, just outside of Cola-Cars Arena to get the Precious Medals quest. Pick up Star Cores whenever possible When initially setting out, it will quickly become obvious to the player that many of the areas and features of Nuka-World aren't available due to power being off in the entire park. There are a handful of these locations,
often barred by a terminal that must be powered. Make sure to take note of them and come back later after the Power Play quest is finished. It's also very important to keep an eye out for these circuit board items that glow red. They can be found randomly in various parks and even outside Nuka-World in the desert. These are Star Cores, and will be
extremely handy at a later time in the game, so keep an eye out for that while on the tour to avoid having to come back and recheck all the parks. Having a companion to shoot and carry loot is extremely helpful In terms of difficulty, Nuka-World is absolutely no joke. Players who arrive here at only level 30 or slightly above will definitely have a bit of a
hard time, as many of the enemies are very strong and deal tons of damage. That being said, it's not an impossible task to finish the DLC that early on. The parks that need to be freed especially are filled to the brim with dangerous critters, so bringing a follower along is a good idea. In particular, Porter Gage is an excellent choice for those going for a
raider storyline. Otherwise, a tanky character like Paladin Danse will serve a player great. Bradberton is northeast of the parks, it's recommended to explore the outside of Nuka-World, if not for the loot then for the sake of interesting side quests. Namely, there's the town of Bradberton located northeast of the
park itself, which is overrun by ghouls but has a few nice spots for some random loot. Related From the legendary Aeternus gatling gun to the hallowed Perfectly Preserved Pie, here are some of the rarest items in Fallout 4. It's also a good idea to come here to grab a holotape off of a ghoul woman's corpse. Rachel will be located around the middle of
the town, in a lit-up rundown house. Her story will shed some light into the situation at Kiddie Kingdom and will help the player with Oswald later on. Going to Nuka World is as simple as listening to the right channel on your radio at any time after level 30. In order to start the Nuka World DLC your character should be level 30, though you can travel
to the Nuka World Transit Center manually and start it before then (see below for a screenshot of its map location). Once you meet that level requirement, you'll be able to tune in to the Nuka Cola Radio channel on your radio (from the Pip-boy). Upon listening to this message, you should get the quest 'All Aboard' and get a map marker near the
Sunshine Tidings Co-op Settlement, off the western side of the map (as with Far Harbor's Quests). Travel here to start Nuka World, see here. No solution is known for Xbox/PS4 but people are trying to figure it out. For PC, you can use the

It is certainly not required, unless you lack ballistic weave and have a physically weak build. RadX and RadAway - Definitely helpful for certain parts. Food and Stimpaks - If you fall for traps during the later sequences or get into
combat, you're inevitably going to need to heal. Carry Capacity - May be needed as this is a long quest you're getting into, so clean out your inventory before you set out! Dogmeat or Someone other than Preston - You may want a companion, but don't bring Preston if you care what he thinks about your character and don't yet have his perk. You get a
companion when you follow the quests in Nuka World, so you may as well use the new person. Outside the Nuka World Transit Center - this is how you get to the cola-themed amusement park. Head to the Nuka World, you'll face the first challenge. At the Transit
Center, you'll have to face off against some high-ranking Gunners, who are nothing to laugh at and even feature a couple Assaultrons that will come at you. Take out their legs, and never shoot them in the head while doing the opposite to the Gunners. After watching a FO4 developer in a live stream shoot an assaultron in the head, I thought I'd
remind people they're weak in the legs and you never shoot them in the head. The Gunner boss investigating the Transit Center, Commander Kaylor, will stealth when engaged and seems to be near level 50 herself. You can actually use the ruined building to the left of the entrance to gain a height advantage for this entire fight. Dogmeat can be very
handy when enemies cloak. This is the Nuka World Transit Center Defeat all the Gunners or consider making a run for it and board the train. I don't recommend the latter, as the new area is going to be tough anyway and the Gunners serve as a bit of a gear and skill check so you do not get stuck. Once aboard the train you're on your way to the new

Fallout 76, I'm looking at you! The Galactic Zone is a space-themed zone with lots of robots for the player to fight. Although
 most of these robots are based on ones that are already in the game, they all have a shiny new look to them that is themed after the Galactic Zone. The space theme in this zone has a functional roller coaster, a unique power armor
suit to obtain and a bunch of robots to fight. With so many enemies to fight and futuristic collectibles to obtain, this zone will keep players engaged until the moment they claim it for a gang. Fizztop Mountain is located in the very back of Nuka-Town USA. In the DLC it functions as the player's base, a camp for the Disciples gang and as a broken-down
restaurant. It is one of the things players will immediately notice when entering the DLC's world space because of its large size and ability to stand out. Fizztop Mountain looks stunning from far away and it is easy to tell how much effort Bethesda put into making this location just by looking at it. Players need to make sure to visit this mountain

What makes this location so unique is the fact that it is haunted by the Grandchester daughter Lucy. She follows ahead of the player while exploring the mansion and once the player arrives in the
attic she will disappear into thin air. The Grandchester Mystery Mansion is a must-visit for any player who enjoys spooky locations with a fleshed-out backstory. Boo! Script wise, the lone wanderer can call out lies, he can intimidate and outright put people in their places. Given my level 96 characters stats, he easily
managed to intimidate any of them, but it did feel out of place with the fact I'd already completed the game as the Minuteman general. All of a sudden his squeaky clean act was replaced, but the voice acting felt a little out of place, short of being sarcastic, he often felt displaced as a Raider leader. late 18th century was an important element in the Industrial Revolution in Europe. The American Revolutionary War took place in the late 18th century, elements of Enlightenment thinking culminated
in the Atlantic Revolutions. Revolutions began mid-century, leading to radical changes in human society and the environment. The European colonization of the Americas and other parts of the world intensified and associated mass migrations

denoting the period of time between the death of Louis XIV of France and the start of the French Revolution, with an emphasis on directly interconnected events. [3][4] To historians who expand the century to include larger historical movements, the "long" 18th century [5] may run from the Glorious Revolution of 1688 to the Battle of Waterloo in
1815[6] or even later.[7] France was the sole world superpower from 1659, after it defeated Spain, until 1815, when it was defeated by Britain and its coalitions following the Napoleonic Wars. In Europe, philosophers ushered in the Age of Enlightenment. This period coincided with the French Revolution of 1789, and was later compromised by the
excesses of the Reign of Terror. Later, his general Ahmad Shah Durrani scored another victory against the Marathas, the then dominant power in India, in the Third Battle of Panipat in 1761.[8] By the middle of the century, the British East India Company
began to conquer eastern India,[9][8] and by the end of the century, the Anglo-Mysore Wars against Tipu Sultan and his father Hyder Ali, led to Company rule over the south.[10][11]In East Asia, the century was marked by the High Qing era, a period characterized by significant cultural and territorial expansion. This period also experienced relative
peace and prosperity, allowing for societal growth, increasing literacy rates, flourishing trade, and consolidating imperial power across the vast Qing dynasty's territories. Conversely, the continual seclusion policy of the Tokugawa shogunate also brought a peaceful era called Pax Tokugawa and experienced a flourishment of the arts as well as
scientific knowledge and advancements, which were introduced to Japan through the Dutch port of Nagasaki. In Southeast Asia, the KonbaungAyutthaya Wars and the Ty Sn Wars broke out while the Dutch East India Company established increasing levels of control over the Mataram Sultanate.
