Writing for radio is different than writing for print. 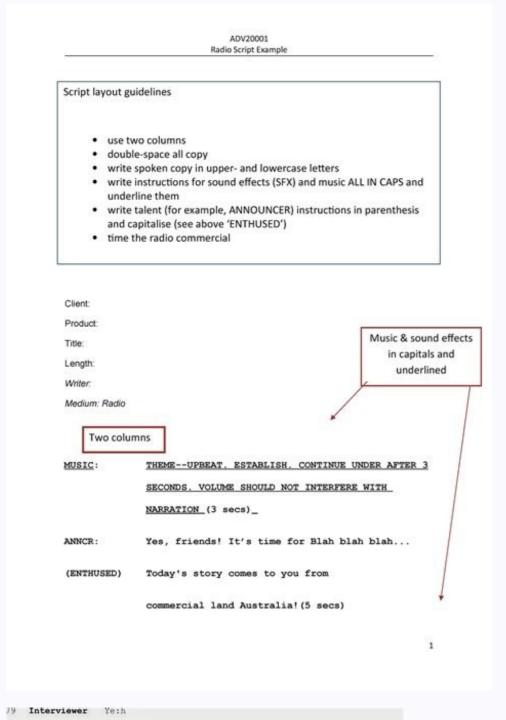
HOST: Did this help you think about things that you didn't need to worry about for the preliminary
