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## Miami masters prize money

The Miami Open takes place from March 20-26 and is the second of nine annual ATP Masters 1000 tournaments. The event awards more than \$1.2 million to both tournament winners. While grand slam events may dominate the tennis calendar, March is a significant month for professional tennis, especially in the United States where the Sunshine Double stretches across America. This period marks the end of the hardcourt season and the beginning of clay court play. The Miami Open attracts top players from around the world, including Indian Wells champions Mirra Andreeva and Jack Draper. With the winner of each singles draw earning 1,000 tour points and a significant prize sum, the event is not just about its nightlife potential - it's a major tournament with substantial rewards for the winners. The men's and women's draws will be played concurrently at Hard Rock Stadium, home of the Miami Dolphins. BetMGM's tennis odds market will feature dozens of singles matches and thousands of potential bets. Each singles winner will take home a cash prize of over \$1 million. Participating in ATP-sanctioned events until May 4, Serbian Novak Djokovic is serving his three-month doping ban. He has won the Miami Open six times but hasn't played since 2019. This year, he aims to lift his 100th ATP title and first since the 2023 ATP Finals. The total prize pool for both events is \$19,387,080, with winners receiving \$1,124,380. Runner-up will bag \$597,890. Meanwhile, World No.3 Carlos Alcaraz, who won Miami Open in 2022, is looking to secure his second title of the season following his Rotterdam Open win. He failed to lift Indian Wells trophy last year and recalled his 2022 season. Daniil Medvedev was the champion in Miami in 2023 but hasn't yet won an ATP title since the 2023 Italian Open. Top seed Alexander Zverev, on the other hand, is struggling with a poor run of form after losing to Jannik Sinner in this year's Australian Open final and Tallon Griekspoor in his first match at Indian Wells. Miami Masters is known for its grueling conditions, featuring extreme heat and humidity. Over the years, many players have struggled with these harsh conditions, while others have thrived under them. The tournament, part of the ATP 1000 and WTA 1000 series, takes place on an outdoor hardcourt surface. Qualifiers and round one matches will be played over the first three days, followed by seeded players starting from Wednesday and Thursday of the week. The tournament will be hosted at Hard Rock Stadium for the first time since its move from the Tennis Center at Crandon Park. The player list for the 2023 edition has not been officially released yet but is expected to be announced closer to the start of the competition. Past players have withdrawn due to various reasons, including a no-show by Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal in the men's draw. The women's draw saw Ash Barty withdraw from the 2022 tournament, which also led to her announcing her retirement from tennis. This marked Alcaraz's second consecutive win against Ruud after their US Open final match. In the WTA Miami, Swiatek dominated Osaka in the final, winning 6-4, 6-0 to complete the Sunshine Double and claim her second title of the season. Swiatek had a impressive run, losing only 26 games across 12 sets in six matches leading up to her victory. Hubert Hurkacz won his first Masters 1000 title at the 2021 Miami Open after defeating Jannik Sinner 7-6 (4), 6-4. This marked the first time a player from Poland had won a Masters 1000 competition. Ash Barty successfully defended her title, winning against Bianca Andreescu in the final when Andreescu retired due to injury. The 2020 Miami Open was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but Roger Federer and Ash Barty were the winners of the 2019 edition. John Isner won the men's singles title at the 2018 Miami Open by defeating Alexander Zverev in three sets. Novak Djokovic, Roger Federer, Andy Murray, and Rafael Nadal all lost early in the tournament. The Miami Open tennis tournament has seen significant increases in prize money for its 2025 edition. Held at the Hard Rock Stadium, the total prize pool for both men's and women's singles and doubles competitions is now \$19,387,080. This represents a 7.76% increase from last year's total. The Miami Open has offered equal prize money since 2006, with only a few exceptions, including in 2025 when Indian Wells had a small discrepancy. For this year's tournament, the winner will take home \$1,124,380, up 2.22% from last year's champion. In 2024, the winner's prize was \$447,300 (or £353,909 and €413,277), with runner-up and semifinal prizes also increasing by 2-3%. The quarterfinal and round 1 prizes saw smaller increases. In comparison to previous years: \* In 2023, the singles prize money increased by 2.5% compared to 2022, while doubles prize money increased by 2.4%. \* In 2022, the singles prize money saw a massive increase of 310.26% compared to 2021, while doubles prize money increased by 269.88%. \* In 2021, the singles prize money decreased by 77.96% compared to 2020, while doubles prize money decreased by 83.1%. \* In 2020, the singles prize money saw a slight increase of 0.54% compared to 2019. The venue for this year's WTA 1000 tournament is Miami Gardens, Florida. Danielle Collins has won her first WTA 1000 singles title at home, defeating Elena Rybakina in straight sets to claim the championship. In the doubles category, American pair Bethanie Mattek-Sands and Sofia Kenin captured their second Women's Doubles title by winning over Gabriela Dabrowski and Eric Routliffe from New Zealand. Previous winners of the Miami Open include Petra Kvitova, who claimed the singles title in 2023 by defeating Elena Rybakina. Coco Gauff and Jessica Pegula won the doubles title last year, while Iga Swiatek also won the singles title in 2022 after beating Naomi Osaka from Japan. The WTA Miami Open is an annual tournament held in Miami, Florida, which has been one of the most prestigious events on the women's tennis calendar since its inception in 1985. With most top players vying for a spot at the final table, upsets can occur, making this event exciting for fans. The Miami Open is considered one of the biggest tournaments after the Grand Slams, earning it the nickname "Mini Grand Slam." Ranking for the upcoming tennis tournament is out: Sabalenka 23rd, Gauff at 34, Rybakina in 45th position, followed by Pegula in 56th place, Ons Jabeur at 67, Zheng Qinwen 78, Maria Sakkari 99, and so on, with various players ranking below them. The women's doubles seeds include Hsieh Su-wei and Elise Mertens as the top seeded pair, while other notable pairs like Coco Gauff and Jessica Pegula have also secured a spot. Fans can buy tickets to watch all collegiate matches for \$25 or opt for more exclusive packages starting at \$70, which includes access to men's evening semifinal match. Additionally, first 140 people purchasing an evening session package will receive a commemorative hat featuring the Miami Open and University of Miami logos.
