So, if you're a seller in Alabama, you must get a notarized odometer statement that is state-specific and provided by the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) for Alabama. You can't legally complete the sale of a vehicle in Alabama with an odometer disclosure statement specific to Georgia. If you're downloading the document from the internet, make sure it's specific to your state. A notarized odometer statement is required for the sale and purchase of passenger vehicles, motor homes, towing trucks, pick-up trucks that don't exceed the weight limitation, and even meteor bikes that haven't exceeded a decade of usage. A notarized odometer statement is used to declare the correct odometer mileage of a used vehicle to the buyer. A seller must fill up all the columns of this document with accurate information so that the buyer isn't misinformed about the vehicle's mileage. You can visit your state Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) website for specific details about where you live. Some states use a federal form for the statement, and others have their own unique templates. Illinois law requires mileage disclosure for all vehicles. Exceptions include: vehicle weight of more than 16,000 pounds; vehicles 10 years old or older; vehicles that are not self-propelled; and vehicles manufactured without an odometer. A notarized odometer statement must include the vehicles current odometer reading, the vehicles make, model, year, and VIN, the date of the reading, the name and signature of the person taking the reading, and the signature and seal of the notary public. The transferee, when applying for a title, is required to provide the transferors (sellers) title, and if that title contains a space for the (print page 52667) transferor to disclose the vehicles mileage, that information must be included, and the statement must be signed and dated by the transferor. The Odometer Disclosure Statement provides the vehicles mileage reading of the odometer at the time the car changes hands from the seller to the purchaser. While specific regulations vary among states, some necessitate submitting notarized odometer disclosure statements and sale/title paperwork. An odometer disclosure statement is a federally required form used to verify a leased vehicles mileage at the end of the term. This is typically needed when you return, purchase, or trade a leased vehicle. Federal law (and State law if applicable) requires that you state the mileage upon transfer of ownership. Failure to complete or providing a false statement may result in fines and/or imprisonment.
