A mic drop acts as a punctuation when an impressive performance is given or an impressive point is made. The mic drop seems to have originated with comedy routines and rap battles in the 1980s in the United States. The term mic drop was added to the Oxford English Dictionary in 2015. Mic drop is an abbreviation of microphone drop, which is why mic is spelled with a “c”. When used as an adjective before a noun it is hyphenated as in mic-drop.Examples No mic drop in history will ever be as thoroughly scrutinised as the one performed by Barack Obama during his final White House correspondents’ dinner on Saturday evening. It’s first origin can be traced back to 1980’s hip hop culture.Rap battles began between artists as a way of “hyping” or drawing attention to their DJ of choice. In most of these instances, a microphone, or “mic,” was used so that the audience could clearly hear and understand them, as word play and flow was the skill that elevated their status, credibility and popularity.In one particular 1987 recording, entitled I Ain’t No Joke, by Eric B and Rakim, a lyric states: “I used to let the mic smoke / Now I slam it when I’m done and make sure it’s broke.”Perhaps the notion of “dropping the mic” originated here, as now countless celebrities have used both this expression and a physical mime, if not a literal dropping of the mic, to signal victory, finality, and triumph. If someone “drops the mic” on you, it is a challenge for you to top what they have done, or do better, if you possibly can. It’s the ultimate sign of confidence in one’s own skills or abilities.In fact, it’s become so widespread in American culture, that memes, GIFS, and gestures have become extremely common place. You even see it showcased in a Verizon Wireless commercial and using the phrase is now a part of our every day vernacular.Use-Office worker 1: Did you see Tom debating with Ellen at the office party last night? Trending Pages A MIC DROP is the theatrical gesture of dropping a handheld microphone at the end of a speech to mark the end of the speech. This is what’s currently known as the mic drop, fast-tracked into the public consciousness by none other than the president of the United States, the overriding concept is of a speech, performance, or even a simple remark, that’s so definitive it leaves no room for further comment A mic drop occurs when, at the end of a particularly accomplished and well-received performance of some kind, the speaker deliberately lets their mic fall, as a way of indicating that this was a job well done which, in that moment, is unlikely to be bettered by anything that immediately follows it. The concept is perhaps best illustrated by one of the most famous instances of a mic drop to date, at a White House correspondents’ dinner in April 2016, when after a series of wry remarks on the race to his succession the president himself rounded off his speech by dropping his mic and uttering the words “Obama out.” You can watch the event for real here. Curiously perhaps, the action of performing a mic drop isn’t perceived as particularly boastful, so the expression doesn’t seem to carry negative connotations and is successfully embedding itself in English in various ways. Verbally, you can mic drop, or drop the mic, on someone (which basically means that what you did was so exceptional that there’s no way that person can top it), a mic dropper is a person who does this, and a common collocation referring to the general scenario is mic drop moment. The adjective mic-dropping is similarly used to describe something that’s indisputably impressive. In fact, the idea is becoming so established that these expressions now largely occur in relation to situations which don’t necessarily involve a real mic – the overriding concept is of a speech, performance, or even a simple remark, that’s so definitive it leaves no room for further comment. The mic drop idea hasn’t escaped controversy however. On April Fools’ Day 2016, internet giant Google added a ‘Mic Drop button’ to its Gmail platform, which terminated an email thread by muting all future replies (thereby implying that this was ‘the last word’ on a subject). The feature was then hastily removed after a flurry of complaints from users who’d accidentally pressed it and unwittingly appeared rude or unprofessional at work – allegedly in some cases even losing their jobs as a result. Background – mic drop As a gesture rather than an expression, the mic drop has been around since the 1980s, a gimmick often used by comedians and rappers. The term today, however, largely owes its recognition to Obama who, by employing the technique in various high-profile scenarios since 2012, has steadily helped bring it under the popular radar. Through images, video and the power of the meme, other expressions in the same vein, where a physical action represents a particular emotional response, have achieved something like cult status on the internet. Examples are facepalm, fist pump (= swinging a clenched fist into the air as an expression of triumph) and fist bump (when two people lightly touch each other’s clenched fists as sign of friendship or agreement), by Kerry Maxwell, author of Brave New Words Last month ... Wait a moment and try again. What makes a cultural gesture annoying when it used to be droll? Sometimes, it is because the wrong people are doing it, such as when parents try to floss (the dance move, not the dental stuff). Sometimes, it has just been around too long and has become hackneyed. And, sometimes, it was deliberately obnoxious from the very beginning, but the ludic potential for irritating people on purpose has been eroded by time, and now they don’t care why you are getting on their nerves, they simply know that you are.The mic drop is all of these things. It is meant to indicate that you have just been so funny, so show-stopping and irrefutable that the final word has been had. There is no further need of a microphone, for you or anyone else Associated with 1980s comedy, it was actually borrowed from rap, where it had a subtly different meaning: I have such a lot of raw human energy, plus such natural dominance over all I survey, that I simply have to break something. This was a natural evolution from smashing your guitar or throwing a TV through a hotel window. It is fun to watch musicians break stuff. No one knows why. These destructive acts are not interchangeable – when Alex Turner of Arctic Monkeys, who would have been fine setting fire to a drum, say, dropped his mic at the Brit awards in 2014, it was embarrassing from every angle, partly because he offered to pay for it beforehand.Eddie Murphy or Chris Rock could argue – were they minded to engage – that their own mic drops were making quite a subtle and self-deprecating point about machismo, triumph and humour. The whole joke of the mic drop was that it is inherently absurd for a comedian to appropriate the raw sexual energy of the musician, since humour is self-aware and energy is un-self-aware. It is, as you can infer, quite a male mode of self-expression: female mic drops have occurred, but so rarely that they are filed by the internet under “mic-drop girl”, as in, “cat who can talk”.By the 90s, it was no more than a phrase, an unoriginal quirk or a bugbear for sound engineers, but, then, along came Barack Obama in 2016. You don’t need the details: his started off as a joke – wouldn’t it be funny if he did it? – and then he really did it, and then it was a meme and, pretty soon, its rich history as a complicated parody, indeed, the fact that it had a history at all, had completely vanished.Cricketers mimed it – India’s captain Virat Kohli bated Joe Root last week, and, recontextualised by Edgbaston, all it meant was: “I’m better than you.” Is there anything less charming? Geraint Thomas, winning the Tour de France, made a very sweet speech that was mainly about how tired he was. He finished with a mic drop.
