The 2025 Sustainable Development Report has identified the Philippines as having made significant progress in achieving the 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), with the country ranking 88th out of 167 countries globally. The report notes that while global progress is falling behind, the Southeast Asian region, including the Philippines, has shown faster progress towards the SDG targets. The Philippines has achieved the 2030 target for SDG12, "Responsible production and consumption," and is making progress on 10 other SDGs. However, there are areas where the country needs to improve, such as SDGs where progress is stagnating or regressing. The report attributes this to the country's failure to enact a legal framework for carbon accounting or a carbon tax. ##### Additional Information The Sustainable Development Report highlights the Philippines' commitment to multilateralism, with the country ratifying over 90 percent of major UN treaties and aligning with the majority vote in the UN General Assembly more than 80 percent of the time. The report also commends the country's efforts to track SDG progress, with over 99 percent of socioeconomic data provided by the government. ##### Progress Areas Despite the overall positive assessment, there are areas where the Philippines needs to focus its attention and effort. These include: * SDGs where progress is stagnating * SDG13, "Climate action," where the country is regressing due to a lack of legal framework for carbon accounting or a carbon tax. ##### Conclusion The 2025 Sustainable Development Report provides an encouraging assessment of the Philippines' progress towards achieving the SDGs. While there are areas that require improvement, the report highlights the country's commitment to multilateralism and its efforts to track SDG progress. Good health and well-being SDG6, clean water and sanitation SDG7, affordable and clean energy SDG11, sustainable cities and communities SDG16, peace justice and strong institutions are key areas of concern that require investment and economic activity.
