For every second of action on the field, we spend several more waiting for the next play to start or, worse, watching commercials. Things are looking up, though: Commissioner Roger Goodell has revealed that the league has started looking at ways to speed up the game and address other fan concerns. Perhaps the most exciting change that Goodell announced is a reduction in the number of commercial breaks and in total ad time. That annoying commercial-kickoff sandwich, for example? Goodell told USA Today on Wednesday that he hates it, too. "It drives me crazy," the commissioner said. "We call those 'double-ups.' They actually occurred 27 percent of the time (on kickoffs last season). And that's still too high for us." Cutting back on double-ups sounds good, and it's just the starting point. The league also plans to go down to four commercial breaks per quarter instead of the pattern we've become used to — five breaks in the first quarter, and then six, five, and five in the subsequent quarters. However, before you get too excited, know that the commercial breaks will become 30 seconds longer, going from a minute and 10 seconds of commercial break time over the course of a game, but it may seem like a big improvement to viewers. The NFL's research indicates that the number of breaks is more noticeable to fans than the actual length of them. It just gives us more time to make our nachos or post our reactions. Also coming this fall with the new season will be tweaks to replays and the timing of the game. For example, the league plans to institute of a play clock after extra points and maybe even after touchdowns, as Goodell described in an email to NFL fans, according to Deadline. He also suggested that player celebration rules may get more lax, so keep your fingers crossed for more end zone antics. The league will vote on the issues at its annual meeting, which starts Sunday, meaning we'll likely see more changes soon. Goodell told USA Today that the changes weren't related to last season's ratings dip, but they may help all the same. Editors' Recommendations Want to be an NFL referee, umpire or head linesman? The road is often long and requires extensive training, experience, and dedication. With players, coaches and spectators hanging on every call by football officials, it is understandable why football officials need to be on the top of their game at all times. The NFL officials need to be on the top of their game at all times are just over 100 people who the NFL deems worthy to officiate the games played by 32 NFL teams each season. The NFL has developed a regional network of more than 65 officiating scouts to canvass the country in search of officials with the potential to advance to higher levels of football. The efforts of the scouts and NFL Officiating Department have led to a pool of about 4,000 officials at all levels that have been observed and evaluated. Once in the officiating database, scouts track their progress, and those who stand out can earn opportunities to move up to officiate in higher levels of football. To be considered for a position as an official by the NFL, the candidate must have been at a varsity collegiate or another professional level. It is required that the candidate must be up on all of the rules of professional football, which can change from year to year. Candidates must be up to the task of running up and down the field. Since the job is physically demanding, the candidate must in excellent physical condition. Another consideration by the NFL includes three seasons. This includes furnishing a detailed list of dates, schools, locations of games and positions worked. The Officiating Department works closely with local, state and collegiate officiating associations to develop a pipeline of high school and college football officiating. The Football officiating Academy broadens the talent pool by introducing officiating to people across the country. The academy teaches officiating mechanics and football fundamentals, along with professional and personal skills. Women Officiating football and helps them get involved in football at all levels. The NFL has a development program used to evaluate and mentor select college officials who have shown the potential to officiate at the professional level. Former professional players can get a chance to use their unique knowledge of football through the NFL's Legends Officiating Development Program.
