Despite being criticized for its perceived anti-capitalist message, the song gained popularity through Bing Crosby, Al Jolson, and Rudy Vallee’s versions. During the Great Depression of 1929, Crosby’s recording became the top-selling record and took on the persona of a “depression anthem”, capturing the feelings of shattered dreams and lost opportunities that echoed the unaffordable railroads they once built.
