SAVE is now using Login.gov as its secure sign-in provider to enhance account protection. Browser users must sign in through Login.gov using an email, password, and Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA), also known as two-factor authentication, to access all verification applications and systems, including E-Verify, E-Verify+, myE-Verify, and SAVE.MFA adds an extra layer of security, helping safeguard your private and sensitive information from hackers and password compromises. When setting up your Login.gov account, you'll choose an authentication method--such as an authenticator app--on a device only you control. Each time you sign in, you'll use this method to enter a verification code, ensuring secure access.With a single Login.gov account, you can securely access multiple government websites and manage your verification needs online. Video - LOGIN.gov Use an email address that you control, preferably a personal email. Avoid using a work email, as losing access to it (e.g., changing jobs) could make it difficult to recover your account. You also cannot use an email shared with someone else.Can I share a Login.gov account with another person?No. Each user must have their own Login.gov account with a unique email address. Shared accounts are not allowed. Go to the SAVE website and click "Login", then select Sign in with Login.gov.Enter your Login.gov email and password.Complete Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA).Once verified, you will be automatically redirected to your SAVE account.No. Your old SAVE username and password will no longer work. You must sign in with a Login.gov account, which will be linked to your existing SAVE profile during the setup process.What if I already have a Login.gov account?If you already have a Login.gov account, you don't need to create a new one. Follow above instructions to migrate your existing SAVE user account. When taken to Login.gov's website sign in with your existing Login.gov email, password, and authentication method to access SAVE. Login.gov offers multiple Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) methods. To protect your account, we strongly recommend adding at least two authentication methods. This ensures you have a backup if you lose access to your primary method (e.g., losing your phone) Choose the most secure methods that you can reliably use. Save has many other uses, especially as a verb and a noun.If you save someone, you prevent them from being harmed or injured. Nonliving things can also be saved from destruction or damage. A person who saves someone or something else can be called a savior.Real-life examples: Superheroes save the world from supervillains and disasters. Firefighters often save people from burning buildings. A gardener may need to save their plants from hungry animals.Used in a sentence: We managed to gather support and save the park from being bulldozed. When you save gas or save time, you are lowering the amount that you usually spend. Things that lower the amount of stuff needed are called savers with another noun describing what is being saved, as in time saver. The noun saving, meaning a reduction, is based on this sense of save.Real-life examples: Many people want to save money they spend on gas by buying fuel-efficient cars. Using a calculator to solve math problems saves time and stress involved with doing the math in your head. You can save water by turning off the sink while brushing your teeth.Used in a sentence: I think our country will save money on energy if we switch to solar power. Save can also mean to keep something for later. For example, many people save money for a special thing they want to buy or so they have some available in case of an emergency. SAVE also charges a minimum monthly service charge of \$25.00 for each month in which a user agency submits at least one SAVE case. This increase is necessary as part of a phased approach through 2028 to more fully recover program costs as required by law and Federal agency guidance.The federal agency charge is \$2.25 per case in Fiscal Year (FY) 2025 (Oct. 1, 2024 - Sept. 30, 2025) and incrementally increases until reaching \$3.10 per case in FY 2026.Fiscal YearFederal Agency Charge Per Verification Case FY 2024\$1.50FY 2025\$2.25FY 2026\$3.10Non-federal Agencies:Effective April 1, 2025, SAVE has revised its transaction charges for all state, local, tribal, and territorial government agencies using SAVE to eliminate those charges.Fiscal YearNon-Federal Agency Charge Per Verification Case FY 2024\$1.00FY 2025\$1.50 for cases run through March 31, 2025; no charge for cases run on or after April 1, 2025. The majority of SAVE cases are verified for user agencies within seconds. However, some verification cases may require additional processing times, which vary.
